

## **POLLING UPDATE**

# Overwhelming Support for Action on Clean Energy & Climate Continues to Grow

In the wake of BP's environmental disaster in the Gulf of Mexico, the American people are increasingly supportive of legislation that will develop clean energy alternatives and cut carbon pollution. Several recent, independent, polls conducted by major news organization confirm that people are looking for a fundamental shift in our energy policy, and view this as a job generator.

Last year, the House of Representatives passed historic <u>clean energy & climate legislation</u> that will dramatically reduce our dependence on foreign oil by investing in jobs and new clean energy alternatives. This legislation is essential to our ability to protect consumers from OPEC and to compete with China and India for renewable energy technology and manufacturing jobs.

The polls make it clear. The House was right to act, and the Senate must work to pass legislation this year.
