Dear Governor Bentley:

Following this introduction are our responses to the questions from Senators Markey and Boxer.

The University of Alabama's role in the implementation of the federal AHERA program, which began in earnest in 1988, started when then Governor Guy Hunt appointed Safe State, an organization within the University's College of Continuing Studies, as the Alabama agency to receive, review, and ultimately approve asbestos inspection reports and management plans which all schools were required to submit beginning in October of 1988. While I was not here at the time of the appointment, it is my understanding that the Governor appointed Safe State (now known as UA SafeState) to this role because of Safe State's very active involvement in the statewide friable asbestos inspections and abatement process in the state's public schools that occurred between 1982 and 1987. During that process, which Safe State managed, Safe State developed a strong relationship with public schools across the state relative to the asbestos-containing materials being inspected and abated. It thus made sense that Safe State would continue working with the schools when the AHERA regulations became effective in the late 1980s.

Following the completion of the review of the schools' asbestos management plan, Safe State, pursuant to legislation passed by the state legislature, implemented Alabama's asbestos accreditation program in 1990. This program, which continues today, ensures that persons engaged in asbestos inspection and abatement activities are adequately trained and qualified. Besides this role, Safe State continues to provide consultation to schools upon request and to provide training and annual seminars to assist the schools in maintaining compliance with the federal AHERA regulations.

It is important to point out some unique features regarding asbestos in schools in Alabama as opposed to schools in other states

First of all, if the starting point is the enactment of AHERA in 1986 (actually implemented in 1988-89), it is important to note that Alabama had already identified and removed better than 99% of all friable asbestos-containing




materials from its public schools prior to 1988. Friable asbestos-containing building materials are considered a greater hazard than non-friable materials because the asbestos fibers within the friable building materials are much more readily released into the air, which is necessary for asbestos to be inhaled (exposure), which could then possibly lead to a disease or otherwise impact health.

At the time, this was a rather unique situation as most public schools systems in the nation had, at best, identified but not yet removed friable asbestos-containing materials. In fact, when the AHERA inspections were completed in 1988-89, the nearly complete absence of friable asbestos-containing building materials in Alabama's public school buildings was confirmed.

Secondly, while a large amount of non-friable asbestos-containing materials was identified in the 1988-89 surveys, it is important to note that it has been nearly thirty years since the AHERA inspections were completed. While some schools have no doubt abated some if not most of the materials identified in 1988-89, another important factor is the number of school buildings which have been built since 1988. These newer school buildings do not contain any asbestos-containing materials. In most cases, these newer, asbestos-free school buildings are replacing older buildings, thus reducing the amount of asbestos-containing materials in the schools' inventories. According to information we received from the Alabama Department of Education, almost 33% or 1,899 of the 5,833 public school buildings currently used in Alabama were built after 1989, and are thus highly unlikely to contain any asbestos-containing building materials. And while we do not know how many of the remaining 3,984 older buildings continue to have asbestos-containing materials, we do know that almost none have friable asbestos-containing materials.

Responses Questions related to AHERA Implementation in Alabama

Scope of Asbestos Hazards in Schools

1. How many local education agencies in your state are subject to AHERA? Please provide a list of the local education agencies subject to AHERA and identify the number of school buildings in each.

There are 136 public local education agencies in Alabama that are subject to AHERA. We know of 508 private local education agencies in Alabama, most of which are subject to AHERA (a few of the 508 are for-profit schools, which are not subject to AHERA).

2. How many local education agencies in your state have conducted an initial asbestos inspection of all buildings owned, leased, or used as school buildings as required by AHERA?

In 1988 and 1989, all of the 135 public local education agencies conducted initial asbestos inspections of their buildings pursuant to the AHERA regulations. These inspections were in addition to inspections completed in all public school buildings between 1982 and 1987. The earlier inspections were for friable asbestos-containing building materials only, but in addition to inspections, all friable asbestos-containing building materials were removed from the public schools between 1982 and 1987. The 1988-89 AHERA inspections confirmed that over 99% of all friable asbestos-containing building materials had been removed from Alabama's public school buildings.

In 1988-89, 580 private schools conducted initial asbestos inspections of their school buildings.

3. How many local education agencies in your state have been identified as having school buildings that harbor asbestos-containing materials? Please provide a list of those local education agencies and provide the number of school buildings in each that have been identified as harboring asbestos-containing building materials.

While we tried to maintain copies of all of the public and private asbestos inspection reports and asbestos management plans required by AHERA, we do not have the resources to compile and track the number of school buildings that harbor asbestos-containing building materials, nor can we provide a list of such schools.

Awareness and Monitoring of Asbestos Hazards in Schools

4. How frequently do local education agencies report AHERA compliance information to the State?

Since no state agency in Alabama has been authorized to regulate AHERA compliance in the state, no local education agencies are required to report AHERA compliance information to the state. Compliance with AHERA in Alabama is the responsibility of EPA Region IV in Atlanta.

5. How many local education agencies in your state have prepared and submitted asbestos operation and management (O&M) plans as required by AHERA regulations (40 C.F.R.

§763.91)?

All 135 public local education agencies and 580 private local education agencies submitted O&M plans in 1988-89.

6. How many local education agencies in your state have prepared and submitted asbestos management plans as required by AHERA regulations (40 C.F.R. §763.93)?
All 135 public local education agencies and 580 private local education agencies submitted asbestos management plans in 1988-89. An unknown number of these local education agencies (mostly the private ones) have submitted asbestos management plans for additional buildings acquired since 1988-89.
7. How many local education agencies in your state have conducted the periodic inspections as required by AHERA regulations? Please provide a list of those local education agencies and the number of school buildings in each for which periodic inspections have not been conducted.

Since local education agencies in Alabama are not required to report when they conduct periodic inspections to the state, we do not have any information about schools that have or have not conducted periodic inspections.

8. How often does your State conduct inspections and/or audits of each local education agency for their compliance with AHERA? Please provide the dates of state inspections and/or audits since 2010.

As noted above in our response to Question 4, no state agency in Alabama is authorized to implement or enforce AHERA in the state. EPA Region IV conducts some inspections of Alabama schools every year, but we do not have data regarding the number or dates of EPA's inspections in the state.

9. For each of the past five (5) years, what were the annual costs of your State's implementation and enforcement of AHERA?

Since we don't regulate AHERA in Alabama, there are no costs associated with it.

10. Have any local education agencies in your state been issued penalties for noncompliance with AHERA? If so, please describe these occasions.

Since EPA region IV conducts the inspections that could lead to penalties, we have no information about penalties. Anecdotally, we know the EPA Region IV has cited some local education agencies for noncompliance, but we don't know if any of the citations lead to penalties or not.

11. Has your State ever taken an emergency action against any local education agencies for noncompliance with AHERA? If so, please describe these occasions and their outcomes.

No.

12. How many complaints or informant tips about alleged AHERA violations has your state received from parents, teachers, students, janitorial staff, etc. each year since AHERA became law in 1986?

We do not maintain records of complaints although we always respond to them.

Anecdotally, very few complaints (less than one per year) have been received since 1988-89.

Asbestos Abatement Status

13. Of the local education agencies known to have or have had buildings with asbestos-containing material, how many local education agencies have completed full abatement of the asbestos hazards? By "full abatement" we mean full removal of the asbestos hazards and not management in place through encapsulation, enclosure, or other means.

As explained in our response to Question 2, over 99% of friable asbestos-containing materials were removed (fully abated) between 1982 and 1987 (friable asbestos-containing materials have always been considered the most "hazardous"). We do not have any data that details how many local education agencies have fully abated the remaining, non-friable asbestos-containing building materials.

- a. Please provide a list of the local education agencies that have completed full abatement and the date upon which the abatement was completed. **We do not have this data.**
- b. Please provide a list of those local education agencies that have *not* fully abated known asbestos hazards and the number of school buildings in each that continue to harbor asbestos-containing materials. **We do not have this data.**

Asbestos Accreditation, Training, and Licensure

14. Did your State adopt the EPA's Model Accreditation Plan (*i.e.*, the EPA's template establishing definitions, training, examinations, continuing education, qualifications, recordkeeping, deaccreditation, reciprocity, and electronic reporting as set forth in 40 C.F.R. Pt. 763, SubPt. E, App. C) to ensure contractors, inspectors, and other professionals are adequately trained to handle asbestos-containing materials safely? If not, please describe the differences of your State's accreditation plan as compared with EPA's.

Yes. The State has an accreditation plan that is approved by EPA to ensure that all asbestos inspectors, management planners, abatement supervisors, abatement workers, and asbestos project designers are trained to conduct asbestos-related activities safely.

15. How does your State verify that professionals conducting asbestos-related work (such as building inspections, abatement projects, etc.) are properly accredited?

State regulations require that all persons who conduct asbestos-related work (which includes inspections, management plan writing, abatement, and project specification writing) must be accredited. The state accreditation agency reviews training documents and other documentation of qualifications submitted by each applicant for accreditation in each asbestos-related discipline. In addition, the accreditation agency requires a review and audit of all training providers that wish to conduct asbestos-related activity training of persons who will conduct asbestos-related activities in Alabama. Periodic on-site audits of

training courses are also conducted to maintain training quality and ensure compliance with the state's regulations.

16. In addition to AHERA requirements for accreditation of contractors and laboratories, does your State require any professionals to be licensed to perform asbestos-related work? If so, please describe the requirements for licensure, penalties for doing asbestos-related work without a license, and disciplinary procedures for not performing asbestos-related work in conformity with professional standards in your State. Provide appropriate citations to State statutes when applicable.

Yes. The Air Division of the Alabama Department of Environmental Management (ADEM) certifies (licenses) asbestos removal companies and requires that only certified companies perform regulated asbestos removal work. Certification requires that asbestos removal workers and supervisors be trained and accredited by UA SafeState, and upon successful accreditation, the company applies to ADEM for certification. Certification requires payment of an annual fee, and the application forms can be found at www.adem.alabama.gov, forms 497 and 496.

ADEM adopted 40CFR61, Subpart M by reference as written. These are the asbestos regulations ADEM enforces.

Enforcement actions can be Warning letters, Notices of Violation (lowest formal action), Orders with monetary penalties and trials (to date, no trial has ever been necessary to enforce asbestos regulations). With orders, maximum amounts are \$25,000 per day and maximum of \$250,000 per violation. In practice, however, asbestos fines have been in the range of \$3,000 to \$10,000, typically \$5,000 to \$6,000

Asbestos Notifications to Parents, Teachers, and Staff

17. Does your State have a template notification letter for use by local education agencies to provide parents, teachers, and staff annual notifications about asbestos management plans? If so, please provide a copy.

No, we do not have a template notification letter. Each year, we hold an annual "LEA Designee" seminar. All Alabama public local education agencies are notified by the Alabama Department of Education about the training, and each year, 20 to 30 local education agencies send school personnel that have never had the training to the seminar. Proper forms of annual notification to parents, teachers, and staff is always taught and discussed as part of the seminar.

18. How many local education agencies have provided annual notification letters to parents, teachers, and staff each year since 2010?

We don't know. The schools are not required to inform or notify us when they provide annual notifications to parents, teachers, and staff.

Reporting to EPA

19. What information related to AHERA and asbestos hazards in schools does your State report to the EPA? How frequently does this reporting occur?

In the 1990's we were occasionally asked by an EPA Region IV representative questions regarding individual schools' compliance with the initial AHERA inspections and management plans, usually when the EPA Region IV office had received a complaint related to asbestos-containing building materials in the individual schools. We have not received any requests from EPA for information regarding asbestos hazards in schools in many years.

20. Does your State receive grant funding to assist in the enforcement of AHERA (*e.g.*, funding to conduct inspections)? If so, please describe the funding amount, funding period, and reporting requirements.

No, we do not nor have we ever received any grant funding to assist in the enforcement of AHERA. We have not been authorized by the EPA to enforce AHERA.
